Director's Note

The story of Two Weeks with the Queen is as richly complex and unpredictable as real life itself, combining humour with tragedy and finding hope where it's least expected.

Mary Morris's stage adaptation of Morris Gleitzman's original novel gives plenty of opportunity for a director to bring the very best out of an already talented cast. Although the play was written for only 6 actors, this production's larger cast brings a depth to the characters that such a touching human story deserves. The tricky casting process was actually a lot of fun, sitting with pen and paper, matching actors to roles, while making sure they were never scripted to be on stage with themselves!

There are some wonderful fun and quirky characters for audiences to enjoy, especially Colin's English relatives, in particular his dandruff-prone whiney cousin Alistair, who brings a real sense of comic relief to an otherwise serious story. As a director I was blessed with the talents of Bernie, Trent and Matthew who have each brought the boys' characters to life with youth, enthusiasm and credibility.

I have had a wonderful time directing this play and attribute its artistic success to its versatile and talented cast, Clare Singline, the set and lighting designer, Lloyd and Robyn Williams, who work slavishly in the bio box every night to make the dozens of sound and lighting cues possible, John O'Brien Hall, whose patience and 'no worries' attitude brought order to chaos, and especially Joyce Birch, my associate, whose wealth of experience was invaluable and whose support and friendship has been my rock.


