### "Just say the lines and don't trip over the furniture."

He makes it sound very easy...

In 1921, the 22-year-old Noël Coward sent a copy of his second comedy *The Young Idea* to George Bernard Shaw. Shaw wrote back, "Never read or see anything of mine again as long as you live". Coward was the first to admit that the characters of the children, and the plot line, were 'borrowed' very heavily from the twins in Shaw's You Never Can Tell and yet Shaw was gracious enough to follow up his rebuke by suggesting an additional scene.

The Young Idea was Noël Coward's second comedy and first real success. The play opened in London in 1923, running for seven weeks, with Mr. Coward in the role of Sholto.

The playwright John Osborne said, "Mr Coward is his own invention and contribution to this century. Anyone who cannot see that should keep well away from the theatre." And therein lay the fear. To confess, whilst reading this play for the first time, I did wonder how we were going to transfer these eccentric and often erratic individuals from page to performance without slipping into the murky area of stereotype and parody, which can happen with characters that are so easily identifiable as creations of Mr. Coward.

Fortunately, I have been given a ridiculously talented, and attractive, cast and the combination of these people and the words of one of the finest playwrights of the 20th century has made this challenge exciting and, hopefully, attainable. The Master's witty, astute and acerbic observations are a wonderful gift and I only hope that this performance serves them well.

I would like to thank, as well as the cast and crew, my Assistant Director and Stage Manager, Kathy Petrakis and Symeon Thompson. These are two wonderful and dedicated people whose organisational and creative skills are second to none, along with their willingness to find other ways when lesser-hearted folks would have, simply, said 'no'.

I must also mention Peter Henson for his, as always, breathtaking costumes, Owen Gimblett for his wonderful set, Michael Schell for the perfect sound design, I am also grateful to Daniel Hitchings, Mehran Mortezai, Georgiana Pinwill and the board of The Genesian Theatre for trusting me with this treasure.


