Director's Notes

This gorgeous piece of writing was written by Noel Coward over four days whilst recovering in Kowloon in 1930. Originally written for himself and Gertrude Lawrence it has stood the test of time. Most recently, Kim Cattrall from *Sex in the City* and Matthew McFadden from *Pride and Prejudice* played the wildly in love Amanda and Elyot to rave reviews.

Private Lives is at its core a passionate love story. There is no doubt, no doubt anywhere that Elyot and Amanda are besotted with each other, but their love turns so easily to violence and bickering. The old adage "can't live her, can't without live with her" comes to mind. Their story is of big romantic love and breaking the conventions that in 1930 only the wealthy could do. It was considered very risqué in its day and Coward had to perform the love scene by himself to the Lord Chamberlain to enable it to pass the censorship. It is curious the lines for Amanda and Elyot are almost interchangeable. She is a very emancipated and almost masculine woman, while Elyot at times is somewhat feminine in his outlook. That's Noel Coward for you.

Coward had a remarkable gift for language just as Oscar Wilde and Shakespeare had and his fiery couple can spar verbally with the best of them. In Amanda and Elyot, Coward created his own Beatrice and Benedict or Petruchio and Kate. They are worthy adversaries to debate what is 'normal' in society.

In Victor and Sybil, he shows us the stuffy, bourgeois, bland people that he wanted to avoid becoming at all costs. Their descent onto the same level as our heroes shows us that even the dull can become interesting. Coward placed them there for window dressing to the main event but I believe that their relationship is every bit as important as Elyot and Amanda. They are all great characters and fabulous parts for an actor to play.

Come meet Amanda, Elyot, Sybil and Victor. This play is deservedly a classic and the *Private Lives* of the rich and famous that fascinated us in 1930 do so to this day. Enjoy!

We boast among our alumni numerous household names in Australian theatre and film such as Bryan Brown, Baz Luhrmann, Judi Farr, and John Bell. We are, however, just as proud of the hundreds of talented amateur actors, directors, designers, lighting and sound specialists who have contributed to Sydney's unique little theatre over the years.
